

About participating artists:

	<p>Anděl Václav (Czech)</p> <p>I was lucky to discover the beauty of Iceland during the years 2006-2009 when I participated in the construction of tunnels connecting two towns: Siglufjörður and Ólafsfjörður. From the first moment, I fell in love with Iceland. Pure nature, open-armed people, beautiful mountains, sea, volcanoes and breathtaking northern lights. Iceland gave me so much energy. I often remember the times and still feel it in my heart. One day I will definitely return to this paradise.</p>
	<p>Eduard Straka (Czech)</p> <p>I'm Czech, and 64 years old. I have worked in Iceland only in the winter (three times) and would like to come back (in the summer).</p>
	<p>Fróði Brinks Pálsson (Iceland)</p> <p>I am from Iceland and live in Siglufjörður. 	<p>Gísli Kristinsson (Iceland)</p> <p>I was born in 1961 and raised in Ólafsfjörður. I have enjoyed photography for many years, especially landscapes and northern imaging. Interest in capturing the northern lights began several years ago when I was taking part in a photo contest. There were occasional images in competitions like that and I found them so incredibly beautiful that I began trying to take similar pictures. I have shown my works in three photography exhibitions - the Blue Festival at Tjarnarborg in Ólafsfjörður, 2005; a show of landscape photos at Listhús í Fjallabyggð, 2009, and northern lights photos at Akureyri Museum, 2013, in conjunction with the exhibition of northern lights paintings from the turn of the last century by Danish painter Harald Viggo Molteni. I started learning art photography two years ago in Menntaskólinn á Tröllaskaga and enjoy interpreting what I see in a photograph. I am a mother of three so my days are often very busy, but in the evening few things give me more pleasure than to go out and photograph the northern lights. I often look out of the window at home in the evening to see if the lights are dancing in the sky, and when they appear I get excited and go out right away because they can vanish very fast. Then comes the excitement, will it work or not? If I get a good picture of the northern lights, it gives me a great feeling of success to have captured a wonderful moment.

I has studied ceramic for 22 years and from 2009 to 2012, I studied at Árhús Kunstakademi, Danmark. Movement, music and close to the nature are three key elements to make me as an artist. Also, three factors are reflected in my work which are form, color and texture.

“Northern Lights Stories“ is formed by three organic pieces. My inspiration is the color of the northern lights that passed through the sky in the cold winter nights. It contains the sweet memory from my childhood when I was lying in the snow, made an angel in the snow, staring dreamily at the sky.

All my life the northern lights have fascinated me. My big moment was when I heard their sizzling sound as I was in a hot geothermal water tub in a rural area. I didn't know they had sound until then and was very surprised. In my photography I'm always looking for signs and stories; in cliffs, forms, clouds, northern lights, or other things.

The winter is wonderful for photography and few things are more exciting than hunting northern lights; to stand for hours on a cliff or by the sea and wait for the lights to photograph them. When the lights come they tell stories and life becomes wonderful. Nothing is better than a good story.

When I turned 50, I gave myself the gift of learning art photography (MFA) at the Academy of Art University in San Francisco, USA, and now I'm teaching the subject at the Upper Secondary School at Tröllaskagi in addition to being the principal. One never stops learning and growing as a photographer, and nothing is more fun than learning with students who have the interest.
